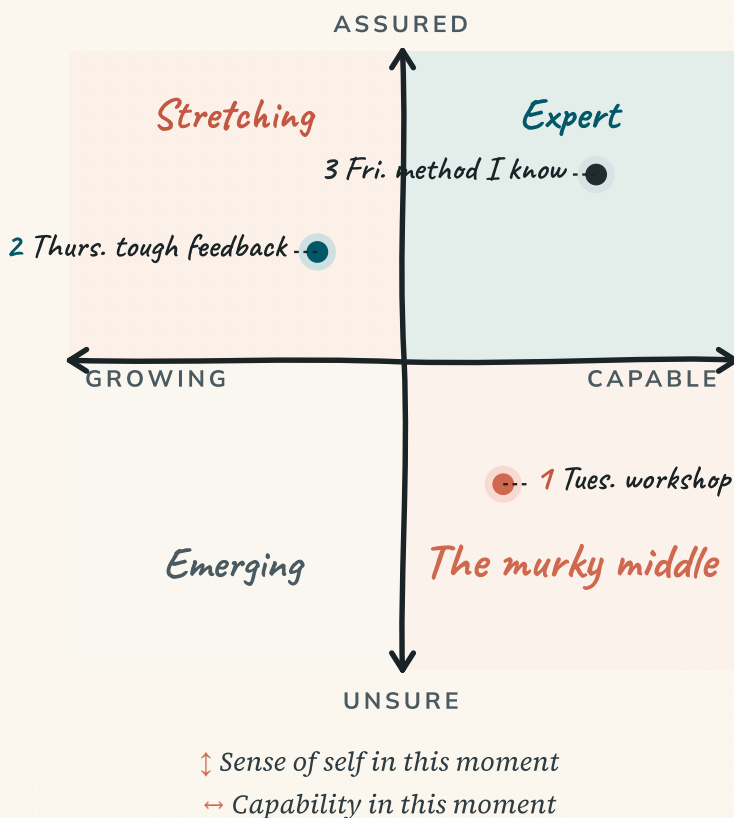
Our competency is determined by the context within which we operate. In one place we are experts, in another we are beginners. Use this reflective tool to understand your own competency through the lens of an Emergent Evaluator.

DEFINITION

Emergent Evaluator (*noun*). An evaluation practitioner whose professional identity and competence continuously arise from dynamic, context-dependent interactions within evaluation systems, rather than progressing linearly toward fixed mastery. Emergent evaluators foreground adaptive learning, critical reflexivity, contextual responsiveness, networked learning, and relational engagement with others.

HOW TO USE IT

- 1 Choose a timeframe to focus on — the last week, fortnight, or month. Not too long ago, as the experience needs to be fresh.
- 2 Read each prompt at the bottom of the page. Try to think of specific examples for each of them.
- 3 Place that example on the grid based on how settled or assured you felt, and how capable you felt.
- 4 Step back and review where all six are placed. Is there a pattern in terms of placement, or in the types of experiences and where they sit?



A worked week

- 1 **Tuesday.** A workshop in a new sector. The method was familiar, but not the language they used. → *landed in the murky middle.*
- 2 **Thursday.** I received some very harsh feedback on a report. I questioned myself, but firmed in my resolve about the approach. → *stretching but comfortable.*
- 3 **Friday.** A method and situation I've been in a hundred times before. Could do it in my sleep. → *expert.*

It's not about the individual experience, but the pattern across experiences.

The Six Prompts.

1 Adaptive learning

A moment you went looking for feedback. Or a moment you knew you were avoiding it.

2 Relational competence

A working relationship that's shaping you right now — for better, for awkward, for both.

3 Contextual reflexivity

A moment you noticed who was getting to define what 'good' looks like.

4 Networked learning

A piece of peer learning that landed. A conversation, a paper, an offhand comment that stuck.

5 Boundary-spanning

An assignment that crossed a sector, a method, or a culture. Where the seam showed.

6 Comfort with uncertainty

A moment you held your own sense of yourself lightly, and the work was better for it.
